Chair's report



The past year has been so difficult for everyone but I am happy to report that throughout 2020 NIS has been able to continue its work unabated thanks to the determination and collaboration of staff, volunteers, supporters, friends, patrons and board members.

We continued our quality research and reporting activities throughout 2020 and published newsletters and updates which can be found on our website and social media channels.

As it was our 20th anniversary we celebrated remotely and completed some major projects and events including, a new website with a new library function, updated branding and a major webinar on the future of UK nuclear weapons. Between lockdowns we completed a planned office move to a different floor in the same building which has helped to reduce our costs by sharing some facilities. We continued to work with and support other organisations in the field including CND, Acronym Institute, British American Security Information Council (BASIC), Nukewatch and the Office for Nuclear Regulation. We completed some major funding applications to raise finance for a new UK warhead investigation in 2021.

We were very pleased to welcome a new board member, Celia Beeson, a new patron, Dr John Downer and a new research volunteer, Sanem Topal.

We were fortunate to have continuing grant funds from Joseph Rowntree Charitable Trust covering a substantial amount of our core costs and who also thoughtfully provided a Covid home-working grant which enabled staff to make a smooth transition away from the office and set up effective home-working systems in early March.

We were also very grateful to receive project funds from Greenpeace Environmental Trust and some very welcome smaller grants also arrived including Lush Charity Pot, SCANS and Musicians for Peace. All our individual

Next year, alongside the new warhead project, we will be updating our Trouble Ahead report with new information on the rising costs and risks of UK nuclear weapons via video updates. We will also undertake work in support of the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons (TPNW) including some research into the attitudes of non-nuclear weapon states to the modernisation programmes of the nuclear weapon states.

2021 is likely to be more challenging financially and we will be working on expanding our funding activities to include subscriptions, legacies and bequests as well as creating ways for our supporters to become more involved in our work.

We are very grateful to all our supporters and funders and look forward to another year of investigating, researching and reporting on the hidden aspects of the UK's nuclear weapons programme.


New briefings



Nuclear Ban Treaty

NIS was invited to contribute to a new report by CND and Acronym Institute analysing the details of the new UN TPNW and implications for the UK.

A summary of the report is published on our website and the full report is to be published later in 2021. NIS would like to congratulate everyone who has worked on the treaty and to express the hope that the occasion spurs a renewed push for the goal of both the TPNW and the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT): a nuclear weapon-free world.



Attitudes to Modernisation

This project analyses the statements made to Review Conferences and Preparatory Committees for the NPT, negotiations for the TPNW, and the 2016 Open Ended Working Group.

The briefing considers the extent to which modernisation programmes are contributing to dissatisfaction within the NPT and support for the TPNW. A webinar discussing the findings with speakers from International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons and BASIC is on the NIS YouTube channel.
