The fact is that a submarine on the sea is a more visible and unpredictable as the most secure and that is particularly the more mobile means of maintaining nuclear deterrence

The Strategic Defence Review confirmed that it is an important element of a defence if, even if, at present, we had no immediate strategic interest in the United Kingdom. Our missiles are targeted at the sea - and have not been since 1996
