Tireless John

AFTER the recall of our nuclear submarines because of problems aboard *HMS Tireless*, currently stranded in Gibraltar, it is time to say yah, boo sucks to Antonio Banderas — who called for its repatriation — and bring in the heavy guns. Such as Sir John Mills (star of 114 films, not just a poxy remake of *Zorro*), who has been out to *Tireless* on a morale-boosting trip. In an interview with Celebrity Jack yesterday, Sir John said: "I'm adopting the submarine. THE new head of the Lottery Commission, Lord Burns, has been widely described as "a semi-professional snooker player". He isn't.
