Operation Hard Luck will be launched nationally on 23 September with the publication of the Hard Luck national casualty figures in the first issue of the new *Sanity*. The ten days from 23 September to 3 October is the revised period for Hard Luck activities, and there will be continuous follow-up work on the Hard Luck Scenario from then on. Groups received a vast amount of Hard Luck campaigning materials with the last issue of Campaign! and there is more included with this issue. The Hard Luck Planner should help explain what materials are available, and some ideas on how they can be used. The nationwide pattern of casualty figures is being divided up and sent to the regions, which will pass on localised, detailed information to each group.

LEAFLETS, POSTERS AND EXHIBITION

The leaflets and posters advertising Hard Luck are now available from the CND shop. The exhibition and accompanying broadsheet will be available in early September. The exhibition will consist of seven sheets, to which local information of targets, blast and burn damage, and long term casualty figures can be added.

Should the Home Office then attempt to introduce any such amendments we will of course be campaigning against them.

WHO DARES WINS

As indignation mounts against the crudely anti-CND film *Who Dares Wins*, general secretary Bruce Kent suggested important guide-lines to all regions and groups:
(1) Demonstrate outside local cinemas, but make sure you do not give the film publicity in most cases; it does not deserve. So protest with dignity and in silence.
(2) Give out a short leaflet which explains how the film maliciously distorts CND's image, and how CND has never been, nor ever will be, associated with terrorism.

2nd GENERATION

SECOND GENERATION is the magazine of Youth CND. It is written, illustrated and controlled by young people and it aims to be entertaining as well as informative.

Second Generation got its name from the fact that we are the second generation to have been brought up under the shadow of the bomb and we are also the second generation to protest against the situation. We have our own things to say and our own way of saying them.

The magazine, which is bi-monthly and costs 20p, is a valuable part of the Youth campaign. Ideally, the magazine should form part of a communication network within the movement (group news etc.) as well as a way of disseminating information about nuclear weapons to people not involved with CND. To a large extent, it depends on reports and articles from groups and individuals in the campaign as well as groups selling it.

Second Generation is available direct from YCND at 11 Goodwin Street, London N4. Registered groups can order in bulk on a sale or return basis and a 20% discount.

THE SANITY RELAUNCH

At the Sanity re-launch meeting in Birmingham, the following regions were not represented: Yorkshire, South East, South-East Midlands, N. Ireland. Here is a condensed run-down of that meeting.

STANLEY BONNETT (editor) emphasised that the new Sanity will be a popular and open magazine, reaching a wider readership than the present hard-core of CND supporters. It will examine issues from the CND point-of-view, but in a readable and generally unacademic way.

Debate within the magazine will be encouraged and it is hoped that the new Sanity will have a more immediate appeal to women and to the trades union movement than in the past.

As a monthly magazine Sanity will be far more up-to-date than hitherto, though the potential for topicality will clearly be limited by deadlines and the lack of journalistic staff. In general it is hoped that Sanity will be an 'amateurishly-professional' publication, professionally produced, though with a rough campaigning edge that will make it more than just another glossy magazine.

SIMON PARTRIDGE (temporary promotions worker) outlined a four-pronged campaign running up to the 23 September launch date:

- 1 a glossy presenter for distribution to the trade (1,500 printed)
- 2 a general promotions/subscription leaflet (300,000)
- 3 media advertising (Guardian, musical press, etc.)
- 4 media publicity, culminating in a press conference and launch party at County Hall, London on 22 September.

The general promotions leaflet is available to local groups, and should be distributed to CND sympathisers who are likely to make use of them.

As a result of CND's present financial position, it is essential that Sanity gain a large number of subscriptions. There are three forms of subscription available:

- Ordinary subscription: £6
 - Supporting subscription: £10 or more
 - Special supporting subscription: £20 or more.
- Supporting subscribers will be invited to the launch party, to an annual readers' conference, and will be featured in a roll-call in the re-launch issue. £20 subscribers will also get the magazine for two years, inflation-proofed.

COMING SOON Publication date 16 September:

- **London After the Bomb:** What a Nuclear Attack Really Means by Owen Greene et al. Oxford University Press, 1982. 142 pages.

A straightforward account by five research scientists of the consequences of a nuclear attack on a major city, using London as an example. They show that realistic casualty figures are far higher than Home Office estimates, and that medical facilities and home-built shelters would be hopelessly inadequate. They discuss the effects of radiation, problems of law and order; shortages of food and water; destruction of power supplies, transport and communications; and the long-term effects - not only on human beings but on the Earth's natural environment.

CND groups, as well as selling the magazine themselves, should ensure that it is available from the major local newspapers. If you find a newspaper which is not stocking Sanity, ask the manager for the name of his wholesaler and for the shop's box number (every shop has its own number, which can be very useful to know). Ask about the number of copies of Sanity they might be interested in taking, and send this information, with the name and address of the newspaper in question, to the circulation department at New Statesman, 10, Great Turnstile, London WC1. New Statesman are supplying a majority of wholesalers on sale or return for the first four issues. If any newspaper reports to you that they are not receiving such terms from their wholesaler New Statesman would like to know about it.

A full-time promotions worker - Sue Small - has now been appointed.

JOHN WEAL (production worker) explained that a distribution deal had been negotiated with the New Statesman.

The production schedule for the first issue of new Sanity is as follows:

- August 13: Commission cover;
- September 3: Designed cover goes to film house; Final copy from groups;
- 9: Last page of copy to typesetters;
- 10: Commission next cover;
- 13: Finished and folded covers go to printers (QB Ltd. in Colchester); All artwork goes to QB;
- 16: All inserts go to QB;
- 16: Finished copies of the magazine go to the distributor for provincial wholesalers;
- 21: Copies despatched to London trade and to subscribers;
- 23: Sanity appears in the shops.

(NB: The first issue will be published on the fourth Thursday of the month. All subsequent issues will have a publication date on the third Thursday of the month.)

It was emphasised that the cover will always have to be commissioned a month before publication date, which will make topicality difficult, though not impossible.

The rest of the session was given over to a general discussion, during which the following points were clarified:

RUNNING FOR CND

John Powell, a member of Harrow CND, is asking for sponsorship to raise money for CND in the New York Marathon on 24 October, UN Disarmament Day. John is 62, and ran his first marathon last year in Berlin. He completed the course in 4 hours 8 minutes, and raised money for various causes including the World Development Movement, Christian Aid and a local spastics society.

John is a member of the World Runners, an athletic club which is committed to campaigning against world poverty, and which last year in the London and Paris marathons raised £10,000 for five different organisations.

We are lucky to have such a dedicated fundraiser running for us in New York. With this copy of Campaign, we are sending Group and Affiliate secretaries a Sponsorship Sheet which John has drawn up. We would like secretaries to make copies of these if possible and ask people in their groups to find as many sponsors as they can. Completed forms, together with the money collected, should be sent to Melinda Letts, Sponsored Marathon, CND, 11 Goodwin Street, London N4 3HQ.

The total collected will be announced in November or December Campaign.

WILLS AND OTHER BEQUESTS

In recent months CND has had some very generous bequests from members who have had CND in mind when making their wills.

Others, like Terry Parry the late secretary of the Fire Brigades Union, thought of asking that his friends should not send flowers but rather should make a donation to CND. As a result of that kind thought nearly £1,000 came in from FBU branches and other friends.

If you would like to put something into your will for CND then we suggest the following form of words which we have checked with our solicitors:

'I hereby give and bequeath the sum of £ to the Trustees for the time being of the Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament, 11 Goodwin Street, London N.4. for the use wholly and exclusively for the purposes of the Campaign.'

If you would like some part of any bequest to go to your own local group then when you make your will please write to CND finance department with details so that CND can honour your wishes when the time comes. Not that we want anyone to leave us; but the time does come.

Sale or return: While the discounts offered to groups will now be more generous than before (10.99; 40%; 50%), there will no longer be a sale or return facility. It was pointed out that while 15,000+ copies have been distributed to groups over the past few issues, only a few hundred have been returned.

Group sales: These will continue to be vitally important to the success of Sanity, even though it will now be available from newspapers. Average monthly sales of 10,000 are essential, and this only represents 10 copies per CND group. It was generally felt by the delegates that there was no reason why they should decline, and every reason why they should increase. The fact that Sanity will now be on sale monthly was felt to be an advantage, rather than a problem.

Design: Lorie Karlin, the new Art worker, will be starting a picture and cartoon file, for which submissions would be very welcome.

Advertising: Joan Horrocks (advertising manager), would welcome efforts to get local and regional ads, especially possible when linked to the 'Focus on' feature - see below.

Local subscription drive: It was suggested that local subscription forms be included in group/regional newsletters. (Accuracy is important here - check with Goodwin Street if necessary.)

Internal campaign news: While there will be events listings in each issue, Sanity will no longer be an internal house journal. Two suggestions were taken on board from the meeting: a regular ad featuring regional contact addresses and phone numbers; and a 'Focus on' feature, in which a region provides a local story of interest to the campaign at large.

Local News: Sanity will continue to depend on local groups sending the editors clippings from their local press as well as any small stories, quotes from local worthies, examples of local discrimination and pig-headedness and, of course, local successes. This is in addition to the 'Focus on' feature.

Political analysis: Sanity will be the only publication looking at issues from the point of view of a campaign to get rid of nuclear weapons, and will encourage activism rather than passivity in its readers.

'Popular' features: These will play an important role in the magazine: film and TV reviews, personality interviews, etc.

"BOOKS NOT BOMBS" OR HOW TO BEAT CND'S FINANCIAL BLUES

As all groups and regions should now be aware, National CND is going through a period of some financial stress. 'Books Not Bombs' is a group of professional book dealers and collectors in North London who wish to use their expertise to raise money for CND.

In November we are holding the first of a series of large booksales in London, selling both ordinary and antiquarian secondhand books, which we hope will raise considerable sums for CND. West Midlands region has already donated a large number of books, but to make the event an enormous financial success we need still more. We therefore appeal to all groups and regions to look for sources of books within your area. Many CND supporters and sympathisers have books which they sell for a pittance to dealers; 'Books Not Bombs' has the expertise to use these books to help CND raise funds. Please encourage relatives, friends, etc, to donate and send unwanted books to 'Books Not Bombs', c/o Sandra McGowan, 11 Goodwin Street, London N4, or collect them yourselves and send them in.

In return, 'Books Not Bombs' are willing to use their considerable experience to help your group or region organise a successful booksale.

Finally, it was emphasised that the function of regional meetings is to ensure a flow of information and ideas from Goodwin Street to the grassroots, and vice versa. It is therefore important that all delegates present ensure that the content of the meeting, and their feelings about it, are transmitted to the local groups in their area.

NB A late development: It now looks certain that the first issue of Sanity as a monthly will be 48 pages long (plus a four page wrap-around cover). Generally speaking we would have 40 pages. This change results from the large quantity of ads reserved for the first issue.

SANITY DISTRIBUTION TO GROUPS

All present groups receive their copies of Sanity through the post to someone's address. We would like to change this procedure. If you want more details as to why then please send an s.a.e. to John Weal, Sanity, 11 Goodwin St., London N4 3HQ. However, in a nutshell, the reason is that by sending group packets this way, and by sending parcels to provincial wholesalers in the same way, we not only 'save' an extra day at the editorial end (which can be crucial both to overcome last minute problems or to alter copy to take account of a last-minute major news story) but we also save around £3,500 a year minimum.

INVOLVING YOUR MEMBERS

CHD groups can be rather haphazard and even unwelcoming in their approach to newcomers. They often capitalise on the shock-horror-guilt 'Do Something!' approach, to break through comforting illusions. Although fear may initially spur people to action, prolonged or intense fear will merely numb them. In Cambridge CHD we have attempted to put this right by forming a Newcomers' Group, where we help people find their own place in the campaign.

It may be extremely difficult for newcomers to feel comfortable in large meetings, or in well-established, close-knit groups; and the structure of CHD groups may appear confusing. Cambridge CHD holds a carefully prepared, but informal, monthly meeting for new and prospective members. At these meetings we explain how the campaign is structured, how it has developed, and how they can get involved if they want to; and we encourage them to explain their backgrounds and experiences. We

discuss the problems of becoming involved in a campaigning organisation; how to deal with seemingly unwelcome groups; the risks of becoming over-committed (learning to say 'no'); and the need to take responsibility for activities to which they may pledge themselves. Much emphasis is put upon the fact that there is no obligation to become active: the Newcomers' Group is an information centre, not a recruitment office.

In total, Cambridge CHD Newcomers' Group has 5 co-ordinators, of which three attend any meeting. We have a table at large CHD meetings, and information about our meetings, and a welcoming letter is sent out to all new members with their first Cambridge CHD newsletter. In addition, the Newcomers' Group has its own posters and leaflets.

SCHOOLS AGAINST THE BOMB: PROTEST AND SURVIVE

The film made by Schools Against the Bomb for BBC television in January will soon be available on VHS video-cassette for sale from us, or for hire from Concord Film Council. Aimed at kids, it is a film that sets out the implications of the nuclear issue in a language that everyone can understand. It contains interviews with medical, military and scientific authorities, all the time bearing in mind that the viewer is not willing to listen to either the jargon of the politicians or the bias and lack of objectivity of the government propaganda machine.

The government is guilty of an overt propaganda campaign in schools, and this must be countered. This can be achieved if as many people as possible request that the film is bought or borrowed by their local schools (which will probably have received the government material already) on the basis that in order to have a properly balanced discussion in schools the written and visual material from both sides ought to be made available.

DEFAMATION

We would be grateful if, when you spot examples of the usual smears about CHD, you would send them to me at Goodwin Street. Our Solicitors are watching the defamation campaign and waiting for the moment when something actionable comes up. This means finding a smear which defames not the Campaign, which cannot take action, but one of its Council or Staff. The usual line is that we are funded by the Soviet Union (I have offered a £100 prize for any evidence and there have been no claimers) and that we take only a pro-Soviet line. Since in recent years CHD has condemned the invasion of Afghanistan, the SS20 programme, the military takeover in Poland and now the difficulties placed in the way of the new Moscow peace committee this is clear rubbish.

Please bear this in mind when registering delegates. The limit on delegates on any list of registrations will have particular places even if there is a need to place a limit, providing they have been registered in time.

1 REQUIREMENTS: Please see especially lines 18-57 of the CND constitution which contain relevant information about requirements relating to conference applying to CND regions, groups, special sections and affiliates. Your attention is particularly drawn to lines 27 and 47 regarding payments to National CND. To fulfil the constitutional requirements it is essential that all affiliation fees and annual contributions are paid by the date of registration of delegates.

 - CND Groups £25
 - Other organisations affiliated to CND £5 (except Trade Unions)
 - Trade Unions:
 - Up to 300 members £4
 - 300-1000 members £5
 - 1000-5000 members £8

 - Up to 100,000 members £25
 - 100,000-800,000 members £35
 - Over 800,000 members £50

Note also line 67; ie, that all delegates must be paid up members of National CND.
