Simple protest over nuclear war games



NUCLEAR war games are going on near Glamis yet virtually no-one realises the true meaning of se actions.

The U.K. Warning and Monitoring Organisation ran ir nuclear war exercises at R.O.C. bunkers all over the entry on Sunday.

At one such bunker near Glamis, members of Blairwrie and District C.N.D. and their families gathered at amily peace picnic, a simple protest designed at atcting attention to their activities.

By increasing public awareness in the exercises, the N.D. movement hope to prove that preparing for nuar war is unwise.

Spokesperson Kristin Barrett said, "The exercises are ried out three times a year at 217 R.O.C. bunkers ttered throughout Scotland.

In addition to Glamis, there are bunkers at Clova, rtachy and Letham, as well as at Edzell, Inverkeilor Alyth. Does that make you feel safe?

'As tax-payers, everyone is entitled to know more

about these nuclear war exercises being carried out in your own neighbourhood."

She encouraged concerned people to go along to their nearest bunker and ask the R.O.C. volunteers who look after them on behalf of the Warning and Monitoring Organisation what's going on.

"We feel it is nonsense to be practising what should happen if there was ever a nuclear war. It's a situation people might start thinking about," continued Kristin.

"The only nuclear situation worth practising would be in the event of a civil nuclear accident. Nobody would have any qualms about that."

C.N.D. members presented R.O.C. volunteers with their suggestions for a "nuclear winter kit."

It contained items such as a fur coat, a bottle of water, jar of fresh air, drawing of the sun and sun tan lotion, record of "The Show is Over", picture of the earth, a Santa mask, and C.N.D. balloon.
