Nuclear war is expected by most teenagers

Most of Britain's teenagers think there will be a nuclear war — and more than half think it will happen within their ifetimes, according to a survey published yesterday.

Business Decisions interriewed 422 teenagers on their attitudes to nuclear weapons. A otal of 70 per cent said a nuclear war was inevitable, and 2 per cent said they thought it would happen in their lifetime.

The survey found that three ut of four felt unilateral disrmament in this country would have no effect on the olicies of other countries. learly two-thirds thought the resence of nuclear weapons in striain was no protection from ttack.

Despite their firm views, the oungsters knew little about uclear weapons. Only half the oys and one-third of the girls new what a Polaris missile as, and more than a third did ot realise that atomic weapons were used in the last war.
