Nightmare of war

ONCERN has been growing about children's psychological welfare under the threat of nuclear war. Surveys of American youth suggest that nearly one-third agree with the statement "Nuclear or biological annihilation will probably be the fate of all mankind within my lifetime" and about one-half expect to experience nuclear war. Reports from Finland suggest that over 80 per cent of 12-18-year-olds list war as one of their three great fears and in Sweden war is the foremost worry. The subject of nuclear war raises such intense feelings and political conflict that most adults deal with it by denial and avoidance. This engenders feelings of helplessness and hopelessness. An American study in the Lancet has found that youngsters with high levels of awareness of nuclear issues had better overall psychological adjustment than those who were unconcerned.
